Blocked!

As you all know, some websites are blocked on the school computers and Wi-Fi, but have you ever wondered, "Why is this page blocked?"

We asked Mr. Baloch, the technology director for the entire school district, some questions about the filtering software that the schools use to block websites and files:

What determines a website to be blocked?

Most content filtering mechanisms, as with ours, work by blocking certain categories of websites. These categories are automatically populated by websites which meet certain criteria and fall within specific category or categories. We usually don't have a say in what goes into a category or what is left out. Thousands of new websites and millions of existing websites are analyzed each day and classified appropriately for which category or categories they should go into.

When using the school Wi-Fi, certain websites are blocked, why when we're on our own devices?

Many years ago, when school districts began using the internet regularly, the United States government passed a law called Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA). Basically what this law mandates is for school districts to only allow access to internet websites which are appropriate for our students.

Why do some websites, though not blocked, don't load completely? (example: Pokémon website)

In a single webpage, there can be links to many other websites/domains. For example, although we do not block the Pokémon website, we block advertising or inappropriate websites which may be on the Pokémon webpage page. Hence, the page will load but parts of it will not. In other words, if all the links on the webpage were from the domain Pokemon.com, which we don't block, then the whole thing will load without any issues. However, if there are links to advertisers such as adclick.com or other domains which we block, then these parts of the websites will not load.
